## NASBA TO HOST FORUM OF INTERNATIONAL ACCOUNTANCY REGULATORS

**NASHVILLE, Tenn., October 15** – International Accounting Regulators from China, Germany, Poland and more than 15 countries will meet in Boston, Mass., (Westin Copley Place) on October 29-30, 2008, to participate in a forum focusing on the critical issues that may redefine the foundation of accountancy regulation throughout the world.

Attendees to the Forum of International Accountancy Regulators (FIAR) will discuss international financial reporting standards (IFRS), the maintenance of professional competency and global public protection.

Currently, the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) is evaluating the adaptability of IFRS within the accounting structure of U.S. public companies. Meanwhile, foreign accounting regulators struggle with the cross-border practice of accountants, as well as different requirements for the various credentials enjoyed by hundreds of thousands of qualified accountants.
